III. Background Studies

Population

Wayne's dynamic population growth in the recent past is shown by the figures in Table I. Following a near tripling of total population between 1950 and 1960, the Township has already added, up to early 1968, more population than in the preceding ten years, with a rate of increase of over 50 per cent.

Since 1964, however, the rate of one-family home construction has fallen off, following a similar national trend due to a shortage of mortgage money and a decline in the number of people of home-buying age (this is due to low birthrates in the Depression years of the 1930's). Apartment construction in Wayne ended in 1977 with a zoning moratorium, so the Township now has some breathing space in which to consider zoning and other planning changes to prepare for the next and perhaps final major wave of development.

Under the Master Plan land use proposals described below, the "ultimate" population of the Township, assuming all residential land goes into development, would be 78,000 (this figure is roughly the same as would be permitted under the present zoning ordinance). This would be an increase of 30,500, or 65 per cent over the present estimated population of 47,500. It would undoubtedly be many years in the future before this level of population would be fully reached, but the bulk of the future increase is expected to start to take place soon.

There is good reason to believe that starting soon after 1970, there

will be a very strong resurgence of housing demand for single homes (and for multi-family housing, for which demand is already strong). A primary reason, besides the expectation that mortgage money will become more freely available, is that the large population group born immediately after the end of World War II in 1945 will be reaching the age to form families and rent apartments or buy homes. Regional population forecasts show dramatic increases over both the short and longer-term future, reflecting this age group factor as well as anticipated continued economic growth: for example, the Port of New York Authority predicts that the northern New Jersey metropolitan area will add nearly 2½ million people between 1965 and 1985, or a 48 per cent increase; and will have a proportional 23 per cent increase up to 1975. The New Jersey Division of State and Regional Planning predicts that by 1980, the regional area around Wayne will be fully developed and there will be an unfilled demand for additional housing.

Present Land Use

Wayne's location with respect to the surrounding region, as shown on Map 1, has determined much of its recent development as the Township has made the transition from a predominantly rural to a suburban community with a substantial commercial and industrial base. Business and industry have followed the major highways, Route 46 and (under construction) Route 80 leading out from the New York and Paterson-Clifton-Passaic areas, and Route 23 lead-
